




2013 ANNUAL REPORT

To Lubuto Friends and Supporters,

It has been an exciting and dynamic year for the Lubuto Library Project, and we've never been more certain that our work to build open, enriching and safe libraries is essential for youth in Africa. In 2013, we've had opportunities to improve our programs, evaluate our progress and advocate for the value of high-quality children's library services across the African continent. Central to all of this is always expanding the reach of Lubuto Libraries to the most vulnerable children and youth, and welcoming them to a space where they can learn, grow and thrive.

In this annual report, you'll see the construction of a third Lubuto Library in progress in the rural Southern Province village of Nabukuyu. Our Architect, Eleni Coromvli, has put her talent to work building another sustainable, traditionally-inspired library, this time with a fourth building for community and teen-centered activities. Our host organization, the Matantala Rural Integrated Development Enterprise, has taken ownership of their coming library and sees its potential to be a strong center of their community. Lubuto has been working with Matantala since 2006 to realize these plans, and we are looking forward to the library's official opening in late 2014.

PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Lubuto is also very excited to have just received final approval and signing of an amended memorandum of understanding between the Lubuto Library Project and Zambia's Ministry of Education, Science, Vocational Training, and Early Education. In the works since 2012, this new MOU recognizes Lubuto as a "National Partner" in providing "professional leadership in specialized library services for children and youth and building that capacity among Zambian library and educational personnel" and explicitly commits support to our partnership with the Zambia Library Service to expand our model. The document recognizes the significance of Lubuto libraries' indigenous designs and the importance of these rich spaces in the lives of young Zambians, and specifically outlines a schedule for our next eight libraries.

With ongoing support from the Open Society Initiative for Southern Africa (OSISA), Lubuto has made strides towards a monitoring and evaluation framework. Over the course of 2013, we received well over 80,000 visits to our two libraries, of which 8,429 were new individual visitors. We've also found that most of our visitors come regularly; some every day. We are now exploring what aspects of our libraries come to occupy such a central role in these users' lives. As the libraries' data collection improves, we expect the accurate user count to soar in future years. Program participants have also grown in number, and we've found countless other measures of our transformative impact through personal interviews and focus groups. On

page 6, you'll find some of our most revealing data: where our library users are coming from. The message is clear: Lubuto Libraries really are a space where the most vulnerable youth feel welcome and cared for.

Lubuto also spent 2013 building both new partnerships and professional capacity in Zambia. Thomas Mukonde, who joined us in November, has been a crucial addition to our staff, revitalizing the libraries' teen services and engaging countless youth with regular story time and film sessions. Thomas has taken great initiative in reaching out to new institutional partners, like the Zambia Information Communication Technology Authority (ZICTA), who will provide Lubuto libraries with resilient, dynamic technology. This partnership will play a fundamental role in new information literacy programming we are also introducing.

Lubuto has also partnered with the Zambian Education Publishing House (ZEPH), which continues to print many of the traditional Zambia stories we've preserved on Lubuto Collections. org. Together, we have begun plans to build a kiosk on Lubuto library grounds where visitors can buy hard copies of these stories and literature to own. As publishers and libraries struggle with tensions between e-Readers and bricks and mortar bookstores, a partnership like this, between libraries and local publishers, really emphasizes the breadth and groundbreaking nature of our work in Zambia.

Thanks to ongoing support from the All Children Reading Partnership, Lubuto has also been able to expand our Lubuto Literacy Lessons, with indigenous language reading lessons freshly redesigned by literacy expert Dr. Joseph Mwansa who also designed the new Zambian government reading curriculum. This means that Lubuto Literacy extends the school curriculum to a computer-based environment that will both supplement classroom learning and, most importantly, extend literacy education beyond school walls. Initiatives like this mean the impact of our libraries as technological and creativity hubs can be felt to an even wider reach of Zambian youth.

We invite you to read this annual report and reflect on both how far Lubuto has come since our inception, and how deeply we have rooted Lubuto Libraries in Zambia. Our success could not have happened without the dedication of our esteemed volunteers, staff, library colleagues, and supporters around the world, and we look forward to all we can accomplish for children and youth in Africa in 2014 and beyond.

REACHING BEYOND STORY TIME


Lubuto Libraries are an ideal platform for a wide variety of programs that draw on the library collections. In 2013, 2170 children participated in Lubuto Drama, Lubuto Mentoring, Lubuto Arts, Lubuto Libraries for many different reasons and with all different interests, but these programs are purposefully linked to be mutually reinforcing and encourages young people who have taken part in one program to get involved in others. The traditionally-designed physical environment of the libraries and the library collection create a common thread, tying all library programs together in a way that extends the reach of what our libraries are far beyond books and story time.





A SINGLE BOOK IN THE LIBRARY ...







With ongoing support from our USAID's All Children Reading partnership, and the support of World Vision in particular, Lubuto staff, partners and programmers have continued to improve our Lubuto Literacy lessons. These lessons support early-grade literacy with computer-based reading lessons in each of Zambia's seven major indigenous languages. In 2013, 978 children (an average of 30 a day) used these mother tongue lessons as a pilot in our libraries while Dr. Joseph Mwansa (pictured bottom right), a literacy expert and designer of the new government reading curriculum, rebuilt Lubuto Literacy to extend that curriculum beyond the classroom.

Lubuto's programmers have developed these lessons on a specially-adapted open-source HTML5 platform for use on computers and mobile phones throughout Zambia.

REACHING THE COMMUNITY WITH DRAMA


In 2013, 604 youth participated in our Lubuto Drama program, performing plays like Rosa Parks, The Lion and the Goat and Mufaro's Beautiful Daughters. Lubuto has seen how much children love bringing books to life. But the inspiration and delight of their young audience is just as important, and a crucial way to connect with children who may not ordinarily visit the library. The youth who attend Lubuto performances are encouraged to jump up and engage with the show and take their first step toward the welcoming, enriching spaces of Lubuto libraries.

REACHING RURAL ZAMBIA

This year marks real progress on the Mumuni Lubuto Library, our third library and the first in a rural area of Zambia. The library is located in the village of Nabukuyu, in Zambia's Southern Province, and the work is moving ahead wonderfully, thanks to our host, the Matantala Rural Integrated Development Enterprise. Matantala is a collaboration of three local chieftaincies, and has a communal decision-making process. Thanks to the guidance of longtime friend of Lubuto Mark Chona, the Chairman of Matantala, all 22 villages in the Nabukuyu area are participating in the building process. The children of Nabukuyu have waited a long time for their library: first meetings were had with the village and Matantala in 2006. The library will open in November 2014.






Anne Caputo, Board SecretaryPrincipal, Anne Caputo Consulting LLC

Cynthia Pellegrini Johnson oversees all March of Dimes advocacy efforts at the federal level and in all 50 States, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. She also guides the organization's research on maternal and child health policy issues. Key March of Dimes policy priorities include access to health care for all women of childbearing age and children; research into prematurity, birth defects, and other aspects of reproductive and child health and development; prevention and health

promotion issues, such as tobacco cessation and nutrition; and issues of concern to the operation of not-for-profit organizations. Prior to joining March of Dimes, Ms. Pellegrini served as Associate Director for Federal Affairs at the American Academy of Pediatrics, where she covered a range of

Founder and President, Lubuto Library Project, Inc.

Jane Kinney Meyers is a professional librarian with over 35 years of experience working and living in Southern Africa for various international organizations. She has been a professional leader, teacher and technology pioneer with African libraries, including participating in the formulation of National Information Policies of Malaŵi and Zambia. She lived in Malaŵi for nearly four years, developing a network of research libraries for the country's Ministry of Agriculture under a World Bank project, and pioneering CD-ROM applications for Africa in the mid-1980s. She was

instrumental in establishing the first positions for professional librarians in Malaŵi's civil service and has promoted the principles and practices of special librarianship in Africa. In 2005 Meyers founded the Lubuto Library Project which fills a critical gap in national development with excellent and innovative public libraries serving children and youth, especially the most vulnerable. Ms. Meyers has a B.A. from the University of Arizona with highest distinction and a Master's in Library Science from the University of Maryland.

Sally Sinn is currently a contract consultant for library technical services at the University of Maryland, College Park. Following a 31 year career in technical services at the National Library of Medicine and the National Agricultural Library she served as Interim President and Director of Administration for the Council on Library and Information Resources in Washington, D.C. from 2004 to 2006. In her management of technical services and indexing operations, she has been committed to the application of technology to improve library technical services and promoted

contractual and other partnership arrangements among public and private agencies to expand bibliographic database content. She has served in leadership roles for a number of national library programs for cataloging and serials control. From 2000 – 2004 she served on the board of directors of NFAIS (formerly the National Federation of Abstracting and Indexing Services). Ms. Sinn holds a Master's in Library Science from the University of Illinois.

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
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

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
