


"I am now the youngest leader in Lubuto Drama, voted by the members of Lubuto Drama."




## Saving lives

ubuto, one of 55 winners out of more than 800 applicants, was awarded a PEPFAR ■DREAMS Innovation Challenge grant to support a two-year project to keep girls in secondary school and AIDS-free. Girls and young women account for 71% of new HIV infections among adolescents in sub-Saharan Africa, with more than 1,000 new infections a day. In response to this, DREAMS was launched to help girls become Determined, Resilient, Empowered, AIDS-free, Mentored, and Safe.

Lubuto's DREAMS innovation is the public library as a platform to reach at-risk girls and young women, offering life-changing programs:

- sustainable, crowdsourced scholarships
- role model mentoring
- expanded daily outreach efforts led by female outreach coordinators
- peer-to-peer mentoring
- all-male mentoring
- family mentoring
- privacy and guidance to youth seeking sensitive sexual and reproductive health and gender-based violence information
- daily family literacy programming

## Building for the future

ith Kasonde Mukonde at the helm as Lubuto's Country Director—and a very talented Zambian team—we are advancing the impact and perception of public libraries in Africa.

Kasonde received an M.S. in Library and Information Science from the U. of Illinois Urbana-Champaign in May 2016. He graduated with flying colors—receiving the Alice Lohrer Award for Literature and Library Services for Youth—and took advantage of rich opportunities in the area, including working at local public libraries.

Elizabeth Giles relocated to Zambia at end-2015 to spearhead training and guidance in children's library services. She is now Lubuto's Director of Library Services. Working closely with Elizabeth, Given Besa has emerged as a dynamic library professional and Hadassah Kasukumya as our strong Program Manager.

These strong leaders built a passionate and skilled DREAMS team, and continue to strenghten Lubuto library services.


# Overcoming cultural barriers

ith our first rural library, we learned that a new type of outreach was necessary. Many parents did not allow their children to come to the Mumuni Library. Traditional leaders in the area held the key to the parents' trust. We invited the leaders to a day to listen to their needs and show them what the library has to offer for their children. Convinced that the Mumuni Library offered great opportunities for young people, the leaders took that message back to their communitiesand children in the Nabukuyu area have flocked to the library ever since.



## **Empowering** children with disabilities

ust putting up a poster of Zambian Sign Language drew deaf children-both in and out of school-to the library like a magnet. This shows the unique power of public libraries in reaching children with disabilities. We expanded our programs and training in 2016 to better serve the large number of children with disabilities by introducing sign language storytime and outreach. We also engaged the Special Hope Center to train all staff to better identify, integrate and support children with disabilities.



"I can't hear like my friends because I'm deaf but I like to draw."



"I am a volunteer at the library. I usually help with cleaning but am also learning how to shelve books in the library."



"I passed my Grade 7 exams and graduated from Fountain of Hope school. I am now waiting to start Grade 8 at another school. I use the library often to read to my friends in Grade 3 at my former school. I can read well in English then translate in Nyanja. Today, I have read six books to them. I'm tired!"


